Preface 2016

Back in 2001 I have elaborated a study on Frank Humphries. Now, in 2016, I have decided to publish it on Internet.

The text is still from 2001, when I used a computer Sharp 3100. As with the breakdown of this machine all my entries got lost, I now have scanned the paper in order to present the contents in the original form. Preface

When I prepared a presentation of Joe Guy in 1993 I questioned if the fiery trumpeter on AFTER YOU'VE GONE by Lucky Millinder is really Frank Humphries, mentioned in the liner notes, and not as expected Joe Guy. Frank Humphries was unknown to me.

He apparently has not made jazz history, as he is missing in all standard publications except for Chilton's Who's who of jazz. Only the indefatigable Johnny Simmen has interviewed him and thus brought him to light. And Theo Zwicky's impressive collection of films and photos as well as his research work on band personnels fills many gaps in the picture of this forgotten artist.

Recently a jazz expert told me that he had never heard of Frank Humphries. This gave me the last kick to write this booklet. It is accompanying a presentation of Frank's music at the Jazz Circle Basel on June 7, 2001.

This booklet describes the musical career of Frank Humphries. All bands and recording sessions with his participation are mentioned. Tunes with solo by Frank are listed with matrix number and solos. The solos are noted as usual in solographies, with some minor specialties:

Style

Frank Humphries has admired Louis Armstrong and Roy Eldridge. He plays forceful and fiery or lyrical, in upper or lower registers. His tone is clear and rarely or never dirty. He may place a strong vibrato at the end of a phrase, sometimes whimpering like Roy Eldridge (e.g. AFTER YOU'VE GONE on Alamac). With mute he plays mostly smooth obbligatos and is not easy to recognize (e.g. with Tab Smith except first session). Licks known from Howard McGhee appear sometimes, e.g. in LONESOME MOOD.

When compared to Joe Guy, his mate in the Millinder band, Frank has the clearer tone and binds the notes less than Joe Guy. But both show Eldridge's influence and are hard to distinguish. Joe Guy uses Gillespie licks, Frank not. Frank reminds often of Armstrong, Joe Guy

not.

As a singer he follows in Louis Armstrong's footsteps.

Legacy

Frank leaves us not more than two dozen recordings where he comes into prominence as gifted trumpeter or singer. He had the capability to write jazz history but the expectation did not materialize.

As a sideman he played a major role with Lucky Millinder only. Millinder gave him space to prove his musical competence and showmanship. On AFTER YOU'VE GONE he is featured throughout, and his trumpet solo is as impressive as Roy Eldridge's with Gene Krupa dating from 1941.

As a leader he was not to become a big name, maybe by lack of a hit tune or by lack of a electrifying "thing of his own", say personal style.

But he deserves more attention as he has created a few memorable if not outstanding solos, the most remarkable ones being, from my point of view:

LAZYBONES with the Washboard Rhythm Boys AFTER YOU'VE GONE (on Hindsight) with Lucky Millinder YOU LOVELY YOU and ALL NIGHT LONG with Tab Smith LONESOME MOOD with his own band.

Generally his output with Millinder is very satisfying, whilst on the Tab Smith recordings only the first session meets the high expectations, the remainder representing rather anonymous contributions.

Of later recordings there are some fine contributions such as AFTER YOU'VE GONE or I CAN'T GET STARTED. Others are partly marred by "funny" vocals: LAUGHING AT LIFE has a rather boring vocal dialogue while the band swings like mad, and the Della Simpson sides live from the excellent tenor saxophone rather than from the foreground actors.

Foreword to the second, third and fourth edition

It happens as always: When the work is thought to be finished it really starts.

The first edition was made possible through the indispensable help of Dieter Hartmann who gave me Johnny Simmen's interview with Frank Humphries.

Then I received substantial additions by Otto Flückiger and also a lot of photos and personnels by Theo Zwicky. This led to the second edition.

Shortly afterwards Theo Zwicky sent further photos and a list of club dates, and Yvan Fournier placed the hitherto unavailable Abbey recordings at my disposal. This material was included in the third edition.

And then again Theo Zwicky sent new information, the most important being that the Vernon Stern Band - including Frank Humphries - takes off in 1932 and not in 1929 as thought hitherto. The present fourth edition is definitely the last one.

Note concerning the date:

It is not clear if the engagement at the Paradise Club took place in 1940 or 1942: Jimmy Powell told Theo Zwicky that he left Columbus early in 1942 to join Count Basie; the engagement was in summer 1940, not 1942. Chris Sheridan in his Basie Biography writes that Jimmy Powell joined Basie on 1943/02/08 only, and that he was coming from Fats Waller. Rust and Chilton agree on Jimmy Powell being with Fats in 1940-41; recordings were made on 1941/07/01 and 1941/10/01 including Jimmy Powell. But the Waller recordings of 1942/03/16 take place without Jimmy, so he has left by this time. Jimmy Powell's statements obviously conflict with Sheridan's, and Sheridan's with Chilton's and Rust's.

Christopher Columbus too says the engagement at the Paradise Club took place in 1940. But Jimmy Butts says is was in 1942/07. He also gives personnels for 1940; these are completely different from this one and do not include FH or Jimmy Powell. And FH himself says he joined Columbus in 1942, not 1940.

I think that 1942 is more probable. A personnel of 1942/06 for "Murrains", NYC, has not yet FH and Hildred, but the following one of 1942/07 for "Paradise Club", Atlantic City, lists them both, as reported by Jimmy Butts. They supposedly have joined in 1942/06-07.

Note: FH's solo over SHIPYARD ranks among his favorite solos. Other sources (Panassié, LP MCA) however say it is Joe Guy. Personally I think it is FH, who plays rougher than Guy. The solo on DON'T sounds similar to SHIPYARD, I think it is by FH.
